- Try to think of other words that rhyme, follow the same rule or pattern.
- Discuss the meaning of the words and try to think of a sentence containing the word.

Spelling tip:	<i>'oo' most often makes a long 'oo' sound (often before 'n', 'm' and 'l').</i>
