Overview of unit of learning:

RED Group will be looking at The Wild West. We will be meeting cowboys, Indians and pioneers throughout this cross-curricular topic. Pupils will discover how America became the United States and explore the journey across the Western Frontier with the pioneers as they settle in new lands, meet the natives and encounter the difficulties and challenges of life on the Great Plains.

- Pupils will improve their mastery of art & design techniques, including drawing & painting with a range of materials.
- Use maps, atlases to locate countries and describe features studied.
- Explore & use classification keys to help group, identify & name a variety of living things in the Plains.
- Use Primary and Secondary sources to investigate the lifestyle of Plains Indians and Pioneers.
- Extend their reading & writing skills, using both fictional and non-fictional text as stimuli.

Topic English Maths

- Locating America and the Great Plains on a map. Using pictures to describe landscapes.
- Using maps to explore the 50 states on which the Great Plains were located.
- Finding out about the discovery and early settlement of America by Europeans, and the expansion of the USA from 13 to 50 states.
- Using a variety of sources (texts, pictures, photographs etc) to find out about the lifestyle of Plains Indians and homesteaders (homes, buffalo hunting & uses, beliefs, work)
- Homestead Act of 1862 & pressure from railroad companies.

Pupils will be looking at poetry this term.

They will study different forms of poetry (narrative, free-verse, limerick etc) looking at a wide selection of poems. Some of which will be written by poets from other nationalities.

They will compare & contrast the themes, style and language used in each, including how & why certain poetic techniques such as alliteration, metaphor, similes, personification etc have been used.

Pupils will also have an opportunity to try writing their own poetry, in each of the different forms studied.

- Pupils will be completing work which is individualised, according to their assessment data.
- We will also be using Carroll diagrams to organise animals of the Great Plains.
